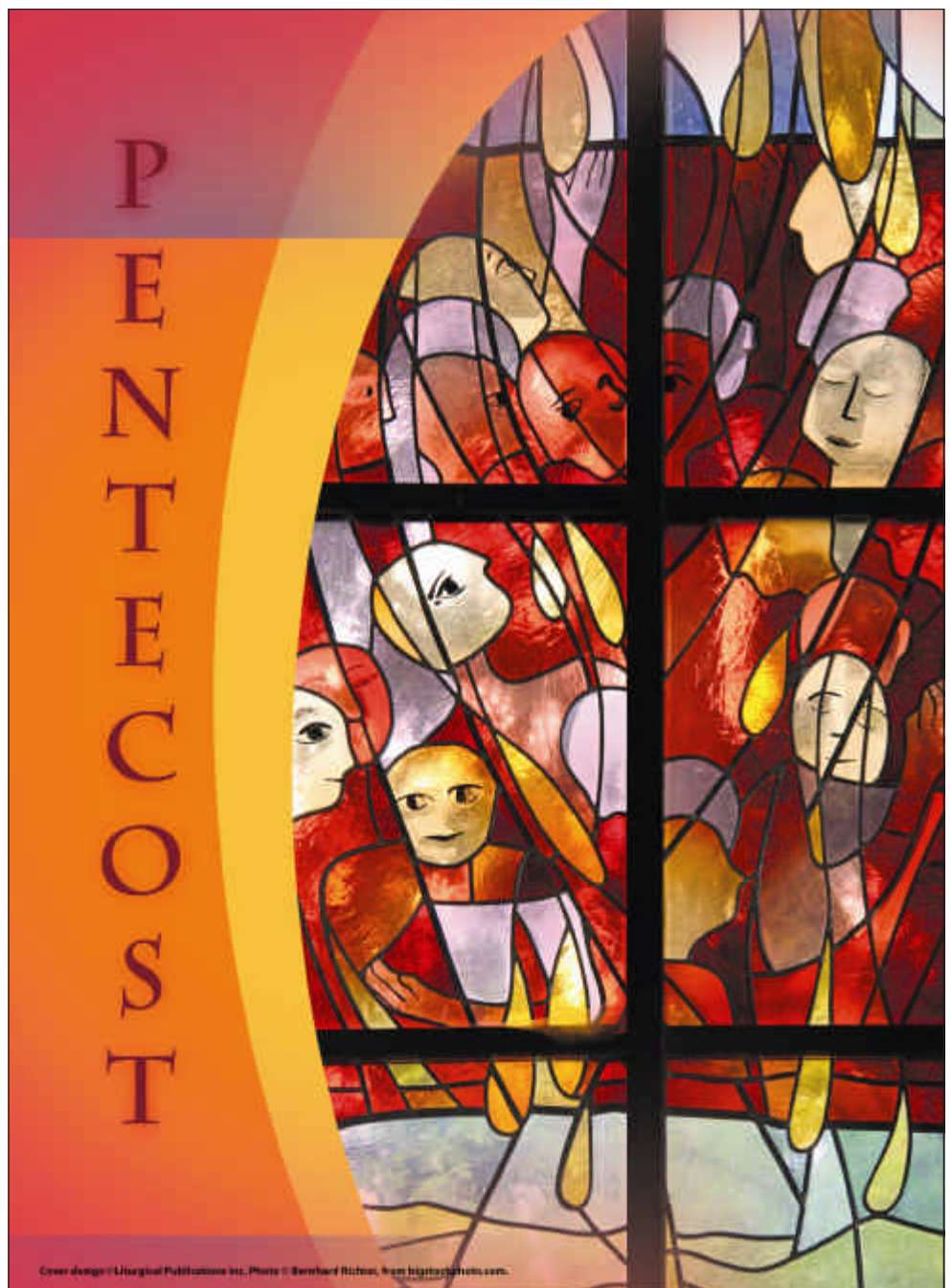

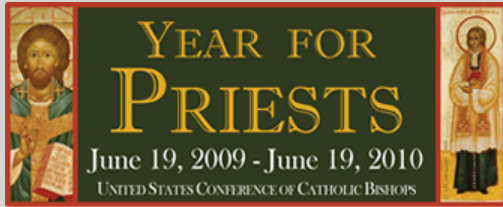

Dear Friends,

These past months have been so busy – too busy at times to do the things that I know I ought to do. For example, I wish I had time to write more individual **letters** to parishioners and friends, keeping in touch with those who share special parts of my life and those who form so many of my fond memories from years past. Alas, not enough hours in the day, as the saying goes. Our contemporary culture demands alertness and preoccupation from dawn until dusk. News is 24/7. The old test pattern on TV is a relic of a bygone era – if you remember test patterns!

Texting and emails were supposed to replace the old fashioned letter, but I still enjoy opening a note from across the miles and reading the news and greetings from friends who mean so much in our lives. Such contact warms the heart and gives us pause to reflect on more meaningful things in life. Perhaps all of us should sit down soon to write a letter. It might do us good. Maybe that's why I continue to write each week for the bulletin. If you ever get bored with it, let me know, and I'll curtail my musings.

Some fun happenings have filled my days of late. I had a delightful lunch with **Msgr. Bill Elliott**, a well-loved assistant priest here whose first assignment was Saint Angela Merici under Fr. "Doc" Doctor James Brennan. He had been named pastor in August after Msgr. McGlynn suddenly died – right after the dedication of the new sanctuary. Doc Brennan became pastor after (at that time) Father Elliott came that summer of 1960. Somewhat unusual to be an assistant with no pastor for the first few weeks! Now he is Msgr. Elliott, and he served Saint Angela and loved it here; he told me stories of the rectory and the parish, and he recalled that one of our current parishioners – now a grandfather – was his altar server! Time flies. He remembers that the rectory had a live-in housekeeper and that the rectory had really just been built as the last building on the property. That occurred in January of 1953 when the rectory was first occupied – *sans* cats, no doubt.

Monsignor grew up in my parents' home parish of Saint Vincent de Paul on Lorain. He knew my cousin, Msgr. Gerald Hughes, too. He was a classmate of a good friend, Fr. Jack Hayes, and he is a most talented man. His doctorate is in education, and ultimately he became the Dean of the School of Education at the University of San Diego. Now a San Diego priest, he has been a pastor and a hardworking priest for fifty years. We are so proud to assist him and help him celebrate half a century in God's service on the 30th of May. Please make sure you see him after the 11 A.M. Mass to receive a

blessing and to congratulate him. I know you'd love to spend a moment or two conversing with such a great man.

Our **Parish Pastoral Council** met on the 12th, and we discussed some future plans, in particular the work of our social justice group, the meal at St. Coleman, the retirement from PPC by Elaine Stephens and Dean Cotton who have done great service for the parish on the PPC. We're always looking for interested people who would wish to serve and get a wider experience of parish life. PPC is a great way to do this. Plans are in the offing for **Summerfest** in Fairview Park, meeting with our cluster partner parish council, work on the raffle and upcoming **Carnivale for 2011**, etc. We spoke about the **new crucifix** and our new associate **Fr. Spolny**.

Also, we heard word from our great principal, Mrs. Urban, the long awaited **accreditation** of our school by the Ohio Catholic School Assoc. came through with **flying colors**. Every six or seven years, we must be studied and re-accredited. This is an extensive review, and not many parish schools receive such a good report. Our report results were sterling with no changes whatsoever! Quite rare! What a tremendous job our staff. Congratulations to all who did such a great job. Not only this, but our standardized test scores have gone up again! Wow, what a great school we have! Thanks again for all your support.

Vacation Bible School is coming soon. I hope that you will send in your forms soon. This tremendous summer program always fills up quickly; so make sure you're in there before we have to close off registration.

This week we are also going to fête our **Preschool faculty** for their successful year. We will say good-bye to Mrs. Jodi Krueger, who is going for a more full-time job; we'll miss her, but we're thrilled that Mrs. Lisa Pocker will ably fill her shoes and welcome our littlest ones into the wonderful world of preschool, our school building, and all that they do to make this youngest lives rejoice in the Lord and in their growth. Our Preschool program has been the ultimate of successes due to Mrs. Christina Kutz, our director, and her amazing staff. They fit in so well in our entire enterprise and work so well with the school experience and personnel. They are regarded well and supported very much by Mrs. Urban and everyone at Saint Angela Merici School. Bravissimi to all.

So, the summer will come. Graduation is in the works. Our summer issue of *Saint Angela News* will be coming out. We have been careful with that publication due to expenses this year as we try to

make sure our budget is right in line. The scaffolding for painting, refurbishing, fixing, and for the new crucifix will be a necessary evil for some weeks, but it won't be up for weddings. I'm afraid we, as in the past, won't be able to take it down for possible funerals. Families will simply have to speak to me about that to see if other arrangement can be made. Sometimes we have to put up with some uncomfortable events to make way for repairs, etc. You know that from your homes and offices, I'm sure. It's like freeway or road construction. The job must get done, but it's a pain in the neck to live through it sometimes. C'est la vie.

Our thanks go to all the priests who came for the **anointing Mass**. We try to hold this event twice each year. Our cluster partner St. Christopher was with us this time, and we welcomed them for this beautiful service. We are always trying to remember to welcome people in church each week as we continue in the diocese with merging and closings. Each of us, if we remember, can do so much to help others feel at home in new and strange surroundings, especially after the difficulty of leaving a cherished parish experience. I'm afraid that the hurts are real, even when we know intellectually that certain things had to be done. **People will need our love and understanding to help them settle into a new family situation.**

This weekend of **Pentecost**, the birthday of the Church, we must pray for our diocese and for all parishes in northeast Ohio. This time of renewal is a great challenge. The changes can be heart-wrenching, but the future will be bright under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Many dioceses in the world have gone through such changes. In fact, the Church has gone through change throughout its entire existence. **But the burden of change never fades.** We all go through it as we must. As we close the Easter season this weekend and pray for the Spirit's guidance and gifts, let's make sure we continue our prayers for all our brothers and sisters in the diocese and that pain may give way to consolation and peace. This is the peace that only Christ through the Holy Spirit can give to us. Think how you would feel if your parish suddenly had to close or merge. Perhaps we cannot fully appreciate what others are going through as yet; but our sincere efforts at trying to do so will garner a harvest of grace, I am positively sure.

Last week I mentioned our **capital improvement** projects for the summer – what needs sprucing up and what needs renovation and fixing. Here are a few very far-future ideas I have that might be worth considering. I'll keep playing the lotto for future support, too! Here we go:

1. Have you ever noticed that the **school entrances** on the south face of the school should really look better? The grating, poor steps, etc. should really be fixed up. We could probably utilize a true ramp there for wheelchair accessibility, etc. I'd like to make that front of the building shine after all the additions that have been made to it over the years. Actually, the school has had six major additions, I believe, over the years.
2. Someone mentioned a **cry room** again to me, and there are differing opinions on this. I have been thinking that a project to spruce up the south vestibule of the church might work. We could take the beautiful leader-glass windows in the rear of the church that we cannot see through and make them into beautiful **panels** – not unlike French doors – that could be opened and closed for Masses, weddings, etc. with a plexiglass/lexan-type addition put there to permit no sound to go through but clear enough for people to look through for Mass. Sometimes I think that we have more people in the vestibule for Mass than we do in the front pews! This way those who feel the need to be in the vestibule will see Mass as well as hear it. We will also be able to see them. **Brides** won't have to worry, since we could close off the windows with the opaque leaded-glass during non-Mass times and before weddings to keep the bride's appearance as stunning as it is now for weddings when she "suddenly" appears at the opening of the doors. During Sunday Masses, especially during cold and inclement weather, parents could have their children behind soundproof materials but still be able to see what is going on. Many modern or contemporary churches have what is known as "gathering" spaces; we don't have them due to our architecture, but we could very easily improvise for the future. Your thoughts?
3. The **casement windows** around the "new" addition of the church on the north side (the new sanctuary) need replacement as they are fifty years old. Now that so many churches are closing/merging, there are some absolutely gorgeous, **never-to-be-repeated** stained-glass windows available through the diocese and their appointees. I'd love to be able to "marry" some priceless stained-glass windows within new and energy efficient windows around the community room, the back hallway, and the sacristy. This

would enhance the beauty of these rooms, save priceless church art, and teach lessons to young people who could admire the symbols and figures in such glass.

Alas, I have more ideas than money, as is usually the case. But maybe someday we can dream of such things to enhance our spiritual home for the next one hundred years. The **Social Hall** is in good shape now after the flooding disaster. We solved that problem, thanks be to God; perhaps we could refurbish the **kitchen** area or even do some work to re-organize the hall with moveable **dividers** as many churches do. I'd like to refurbish the **stage, get a new curtain, work on the seminar (Moose) room**, etc. But these are all ideas that lurk in my brain. Some of the rooms in the Social Hall area are underused because they are underfurnished or fashioned/formed, if you catch my meaning. The next time you are in church, wander through the vestibule with these thoughts in mind. The next time you are standing in front of the school, take a long look. The next time you are in the Social Hall, take a gander around.

One final hope of mine is someday to remodel the entrance to the Parish Center. This old marvelous building was once the church and then a convent. The contemporary demands of an office such as ours need a much better thought-out design for technology, etc. We wouldn't have to tear down the building, but simply move a wall quite easily and extend the front office across the front face of the building, not south on the lawn but internally. We could then have more room for visitors and those needing the help of secretaries, people waiting to see someone, and also have the advantage of a better design for safety for those answering the door. Many churches and offices have done something similar. I was recently at St. Charles Borromeo, and their offices are quite beautiful but very, very **practical** and easy-to-use for employees and parishioners. Quite nice, actually. As in many areas of life, the designs of yesteryear don't always meet the needs of the present and the future.

So, my mind continues to move in strange directions. Any time you have such ideas, give me a call or stop by and tell me. As our community of faith goes forward, we have many things to ponder – our relationship with our cluster partner, the

intensity and need of evangelization efforts to help spark faith in others, the strength of our Catholic schools and PSR programs for religious formation for young people and adults, our YOSA program (our new youth minister will be announced soon), the need for outreach to others, the Church in the City program, etc. Many, many opportunities to share and grow in faith present themselves to us each day.

This summer we are preparing for many marriage celebrations. I'm planning on a few weeks off here and there for vacation. Fr. Greg is, too. In the next weeks we will be sitting down with the whole staff for calendar updating. The school is growing and achieving heights by leaps and bounds. Things are never dull around here. Our newest survey will be out in the next month or so to elicit your comments. **I still would like to hear your thoughts** on Mass times, for example, and your thoughts and feelings regarding the quality of worship at our Masses, music, sermons, etc. If we are to grow, we need feedback. As I have mentioned before, our staff needs your input if we are to serve you well. For example, we very well may hold some sessions regarding Matthew Kelly's book, *Rediscovering Catholicism* – I still want all of us to read and ponder this good book.

I also hope that you have seen the fine work of Deacon Jim Agrippe in his holy card design and banner designs for our community and for St. Chris' community. Jim had the idea of having the images of Saint Angela Merici and Saint Christopher themselves visibly present to enhance our cluster relationship. His knowledge of the print business and the newest technology together with his friends and colleagues in the business made this dream a reality for all of us. Many thanks, Jim.

Don't forget David Tidyman's concert at Trinity Lutheran on June 6th. You'll enjoy the afternoon, especially with the other instrumentalists and with Coeli Ingold, the fabulous soprano who so often graces our church with her mellifluous voice. If you remember, she sang for our communal penance service and most recently for our Mothers' Mass for the school. You won't want to miss her and David in this gala event.

More next week on our new priest! I'm talking too long this week. Happy last days of May. Remember the Blessed Virgin Mary. Oremus pro invicem. Soli Deo Gloria.
